After a short six weeks on the job, it is an honor to describe what I see as I orient to the Guadalupe Clinic. The Guadalupe Clinic has always been my favorite charity and now I have the privilege of seeing the work up close and personal! I have witnessed the mission of serving the working poor in so many ways. Our typical patient is working multiple jobs trying to support his or her family. They have no insurance, Medicare or Medicaid. Many of our patients are single moms who need standard healthcare as well as the survival basics of food, formula, diapers, and blankets.

Donations from a generous community are the lifeline for the Guadalupe Clinic. We would like to thank everyone who helps to serve the Guadalupe Clinic's mission. All of our physicians are volunteers. As highlighted in this newsletter, the University of Kansas JayDocs also donate their time to help provide medical care weekly. We have one full time nurse and several part time nurses who are assisted by over 40 nurses who volunteer from every area of city. The Guadalupe Clinic is blessed with many clerical volunteers who help with non-confidential data entry and organizing charts and files. Winefest and Wingnut Baseball game volunteers work year round to ensure that these two major events are successful to fund the clinic into the future. Doctors offices donate sample medications and generous people support us with donations each month so the Guadalupe Clinic is able to continue to serve the working poor. The donations of time, talent and treasure from hundreds of volunteers are critical for our mission to continue. A special "thank you" for all you do to support the Guadalupe Clinic.

The South Hillside Spotlight

After receiving Bishop Jackel's approval and support, the ministries of the Diocese of Wichita have been extended to needy residents of the southeast part of town. Guadalupe Clinic's outreach facility opened for business the week of January 23, 2012 and shares space with the Catholic Charities Food Pantry in a building adjacent to the new Lord's Diner location at 2825 S. Hillside. The facility was constructed with the guidance of Dan Alcala of The Law Company, with the generosity and support of subcontractors and suppliers from the Wichita construction community.

- The new Guadalupe Clinic on South Hillside facility is now open five days per week, and patient visits are steadily increasing as the clinic becomes further established in the Southeast Wichita community
- Following the success of an initial health fair, the clinic's planning calendar includes a second health fair to be held in the fall
- New chairs have been installed in the waiting area. These provide durable, comfortable seating for patients waiting to see a health care professional
- An electrocardiogram (EKG) machine will soon be purchased for the site, significantly increasing the ability to provide comprehensive care without the need to refer patients elsewhere

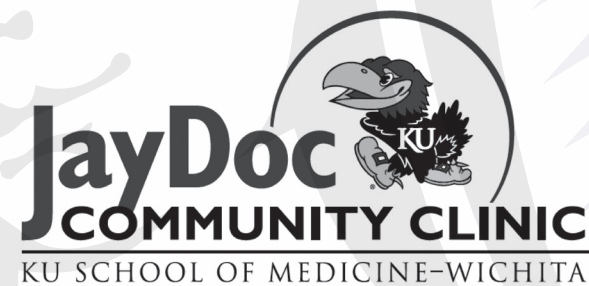


Special Saturdays

There's an extra spark of energy evident at the clinic on Saturdays; that's when the JayDocs volunteer their services. As medical students at the University Of Kansas School Of Medicine - Wichita, they are very enthusiastic about the opportunity to practice their craft. Cites JayDoc Sarah Corn: "All of us enter medical school with the vision of saving people, and instead we immediately begin two years of books. Volunteering for JayDoc Community Clinic at Guadalupe Clinic is a reminder of what we entered school for; it is wonderful to interact in a community setting. In turn we all learn so much from our JayDoc patients that helps us in our chosen profession".

Medical students of all classes spend time at the clinic, typically ten medical and pre-medical student volunteers each Saturday. Last year, approximately 83 medical students and 18 pre-medical students volunteered at the clinic. JayDocs provide assessment of clinic patients and treatment recommendations, all under supervision of a volunteer doctor who signs off on the student's diagnosis. Pam Stanberry, Clinic Executive Director adds "This program maximizes the effectiveness of our physician volunteers and allows us to maintain Saturday morning hours at our St. Francis Street Clinic, while at the same time providing an invaluable teaching and learning venue".

JayDoc Sarah Corn is a native of Inman, Kansas and is currently a fourth year student at KUMC. With BS and MS degrees in kinesiology (the scientific study of human movement) from Kansas State University, she proudly wears the Wildcat pin on her white coat across from the Jayhawk. She currently serves as Executive Co-Director, working with nine other student board members to manage their participation. She has completed a year of service at the clinic and plans to pursue a career in surgery. With "294 days left" at the time of her interview, she as well as all the JayDocs carry the thanks and best wishes of Guadalupe Clinic staff and patients as they complete their journey through medical school.

Annual Events Underscore Strong Community Support for the Clinic

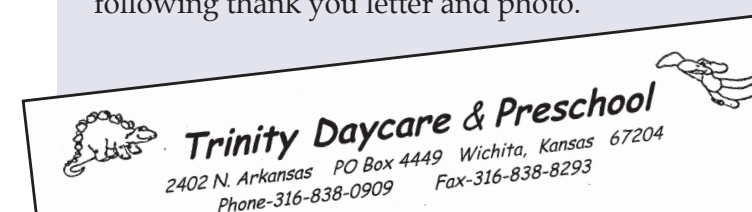

Organized and operated as a benefit for the Guadalupe Health Foundation, the **Midwest Winefest** has become a major gathering of clinic supporters and wine aficionados in this region. 
The Guadalupe Clinic in the Community
